Make sure you have visited the apartment or house, seen in person and met the landlord. Others may attempt to subcontract their space illegally, resulting in problems with the owner of the property. When possible, it is better to apply to a rental agency or a management group rather than to deal with individuals, since there will be adequate contracts and procedures. 4. Insurance Many students can choose to enter Renterâ |s Insurance when moving out of campus. Even if not required, type of insurance can protect the contents of their rooms in case of theft or fire. Monthly costs are generally minimal but can make all the difference if the unthinkable happens. 5. Rental Basics Once students have found the perfect off-campus accommodation, lined up roommates and made sure it's not a scam, it's time to close the deal. It's very important to review the terms the lease agreement to make sure everyone living in space understands what they are agreeing to do. While students may be accustomed to accommodation offered on a semester basis, off-campus accommodation typically requires a 12-month lease. Are all the roommates clear about their responsibility to pay for a full year? If not, does the lease permit sub-letters during the summer months? If students are not financially independent, some layoffs will require a parent or guardian to co-sign, ensuring that rent is paid in the case of the student with insufficient funds. It is also important to make sure that a property inspection is completed at the beginning and end of the rental agreement to ensure students are not charged for any pre-existing problems with the home.
