These types of points are usually removed 3 days to 3 weeks after surgery. This will depend on where they are and how fast it heals. Sometimes, your incision will be closed with internal points (points under the surface of the skin). Those typically are absorbed from your body gradually and you don't need to remove. Healing skin may need months to regain most of your strength. Limit the movement around the points.
